of heart, repentant confession of sins, and renewing our vows to the Most High" (Testimonies for the Church, volume 2, pages 600 and 601) (adapted).

For many years God's people in Israel attended the festivals, such as the Passover in Jerusalem. They traveled long distances by foot and donkey. Jesus' parents took Jesus along to attend the Passover. It was a time of joy and celebration in remembrance of the Lord's great work of caring for His people in the past. All Hebrew males were required to go, but wives and the families sometimes volunteered to go with their husbands. The festivals were required for their sake to remember God's great care for them through the year.

These festivals remind me of our yearly camp meetings where God's people come together for fellowshipping with other brothers and sisters whom they have not seen for a long time and for fellowshipping with the Lord through the messages given by speakers. Camp meetings are the favorite time for the Deaf because many of them are alone in their homes so it is a good opportunity for them to be with others at the camp meeting. Some of them come for support and encouragement of the fellow members. Of course, they talk and talk for a long time sharing their news and experience throughout the year.

Are you planning to go? Have you saved your money so

you can attend one of them this year? There are four Deaf camp meetings and two retreats—one for men and one for women. The first camp meeting this summer is the Western Deaf Camp Meeting at Milo Adventist Academy in Oregon this July. There will be two CODA speakers, Alan Meis and Ralph Blank. The second one is Southern Deaf Fellowship (SDF) Camp Meeting in Georgia. The guest speaker is H. Schubert Palmer, M.D. from Loma Linda University. The next camp meeting is DEAF Camp Meeting in Massachusetts with the guest speakers of Elder Paul Kelly and Margie English. Deaf Young Adult Christian (DYAC) will be held in Mt. Aetna, MD. Then at about the same time and place as DYAC DEAR Camp Meeting will have a guest speaker, Clifford Goldstein, who is the editor of Sabbath School Department in the GC. Deaf Christian Women's Ministry 17th Annual Retreat will be held in Oregon, and the guest speaker will be announced soon. Pacific Northwest Bible Fellowship Men's Retreat will be held in Oregon at different location. The quest speaker is Elder David Trexler.

Speaker's Dialogue: Intercessory Prayers for Souls

"Also, I tell you that if two of you on earth agree about something and pray for it, it will be done for you by my Father in heaven" (Matthew 18:19, NCV).

"I remember in Battle Creek when there were God's people who felt the burden for the lost people, who were in darkness and saw no light. Then they started prayer meetings that they might receive the strength of God. In every case the heavenly angels worked with these efforts, and lost people were saved.

If there are many members in the church, let them start small groups to work for the church members and for unbelievers. If in one place there are only two or three who know the truth, let them become a group of workers. Let them keep themselves together in unity and love. They can give encouragement to one another to move forward with courage and strength through the support of the others. Let them show Christlike behavior and patience. They need to speak with careful words through using the gift of speech to help one another up in the most holy faith. Let them work in Christlike love for the lost souls. . . . As they work and pray in Christ's name, their numbers will increase.

There is home missionary work that is to be done, and we hear the plea, So long as there is so much sin and great need of work in our own country, then why should we show much interest and zeal for foreign countries? I answer, Our field is the world. . . . Jesus commanded His disciples to begin their work in Jerusalem, and then pass on through Judea and Samaria, and to the most part of the earth. Only a small number of the people accepted the truth, but the messengers gave the message of salvation rapidly from place to place, passing from country to country, sharing the gospel in all the near and faraway places of the earth. But there was a preparatory work. Jesus' promise was, "... when the Holy Spirit comes to you, you will receive power. You will be my witnesses—in Jerusalem, in all of Judea, in Samaria, and in every part of the world." God's people will not follow their own ways and desires. They seek counsel of the Lord, and they will be

able to teach the gospel through the blessings of the Holy Spirit." (Maranatha, page 38), (adapted)

If we follow this counsel we will see more Deaf people learning the truth we are sharing with them. This is the Three Angels Deaf Ministries' goal. We give encouragement, training, gospel materials, and workers to spread the seeds of truth about Jesus Christ and His wonderful teachings that can help Deaf people to find true happiness. We also should not forget to pray for our Deaf brothers and sisters in other countries. Remember, let us do something better in 2019 as we are almost at the door of the real kingdom of God



We all need to be willing to make friends in our Deaf community so that they feel comfortable responding when we invite them to learn more about Jesus.

At the 3ADM booth, we met a Deaf couple who live close to the Colgans' church. They are looking for a church, and hope that they find a place where the husband who is Deaf-Blind can feel comfortable worshipping. We also met a young man who is part of a Deaf group of people from Africa who live in Worcester who are looking for someone to study the Bible with them.

In other exciting news, a Deaf young man stopped at our booth, asking what religion we belong to. When I signed to him, "Seventh-Day Adventist," you could see his real big smile and he shook my hands vigorously. He said that he is also a Seventh-Day Adventist. He did not know of any other Deaf Adventists until he met us for the first time! Also, he lives not far from Worcester, MA where Jessica lives. We can imagine the angels in heaven singing! I believe this taught us a valuable lesson. Why? Some of us do not feel comfortable in telling people that

we are SDA and prefer to say that we are Christians. BUT look here, if I said that we are Christians, that Deaf young SDA man might have walked away and missed the chance to meet us who are also SDA. Because of the different faiths represented in the DEAF group, there were lively discussions after each presentation. Deaf attendees eagerly shared their questions and reactions to the messages presented. For many this is their only opportunity to discuss God all year. Having Francisca there to answer questions and present the gospel was a benefit to all.

The Annual DEAF Weekend gives Deaf people an opportunity to get together and form new friendships while renewing old ones. They catch up, pray for each other, and exchange contact information so connections can continue after the weekend.

Free prizes were raffled off, including mugs, water bottles, Easy English Christian books, and Christian

DVDs in ASL. The grand prize was a full scholarship to our upcoming 2019 DEAF Camp to be held August 21st to 25th in Huntington, MA. In Memory

Lee Roy McKinney
January 30, 1936—April 20, 2019



Lee Roy McKinney was born at home on January 30, 1936, in Carroll County (Pipers Gap) Virginia, to Nathan Mags and Blanche Vernon McKinney. Lee Roy could speak normally until the age of 4 or 5 when he contracted measles. Gradually after the measles cleared, he stopped speaking and could only make sounds. He was able to hear words but they were like a foreign language and his brain could not interpret them. His sister recalls that their mother had a special way of communicating with Lee Roy which they both understood. He did love to hear piano and organ music at church.

After several years and many doctors' appointments his parents decided to send him, at the age of 7, to the Virginia School for the Deaf and Blind. He learned to build cabinets in school and made several pieces of furniture. He played all types of sports and was hailed the Ping Pong champion for several years.

After school, he moved to Roanoke and started working at Miller Container Box Company. He met a deaf couple in the area who invited him to the Roanoke Seventh-day Adventist Church. He was baptized in 1962. This is where he met Margaret Lee Turner whom he married on April 13, 1963. Stephen Lee was born to them in 1964 and Rhonda Gail in 1969. Margaret encouraged Lee Roy to start working part-time in the Colporteur Ministry, which later turned into a fulltime employment. He did so well that in 1970 he was named Columbia Union's Literature Evangelist Man-of-the-Year. He used preprinted flash cards to go door-to-door and communicated in that manner with potential buyers of his books. He did this until March 2018, when he could no longer drive.

He loved Jesus and his church. He was never shy about approaching someone and giving them a tract about a seminar, an upcoming event, or a piece of Christian literature. He never allowed his disability to hold him back from accomplishing whatever he had his mind and heart set to do. He was truly an inspiration to us all! Lee Roy was a very sociable person and he found it very difficult this past year not being able to visit all of his friends and family as well as the various churches that he loved to attend.

He never met a stranger and was always willing to help where help was needed. He learned to work on and fix the family's cars, which saved money for the family. He loved to do yard work and would keep tools and gloves in his car to help if he happened upon someone in need.

Don Schneider



Don C. Schneider, former president (of the Seventh-day Adventist Church in North America (NAD), passed away this morning, May 23, 2019, in Texas, where he was living with Marti, his wife and partner in ministry. He was 76.

Schneider served as NAD president for 10 years. He was elected to the office in 2000 at the General Conference Session in Toronto, Ontario, Canada. Prior to this, he served as Lake Union Conference president for almost six years.

Several friends and former colleagues shared the following words upon hearing of Schneider's death. "Don was 'the Jesus man.' There is no more eloquent statement that can be made," said Daniel R. Jackson, current NAD president. "He travelled throughout the NAD and the world declaring that Jesus was his best friend. His loss will never be equated with being

forgotten. He was a 'one of a kind' man and leader." G. Alexander Bryant, NAD executive secretary, shared that "Don Schneider's greatest passion was to introduce people to his best friend, Jesus. He sought to model this to his colleagues in many ways, but one comes to mind: he routinely had block ice cream parties for his neighbors to try and show love and genuine compassion for them. I don't know how he managed this with his hectic travel schedule, but he did. He truly lived what he preached. It was a pleasure to serve with him. He was my friend; he will be missed."

Remembering Don Schneider

Bunny and I were saddened to learn that former North American Division President Don C. Schneider passed away on May 23, 2019. When I had worked for ADM, Bunny and I met Don many times and greatly respected him and his wife, Marti.

When I sent a letter to Don suggesting that he appoint Debra Brill to oversee Deaf Ministries issues within the NAD, I was surprised when Don came up to me and Bunny while we were at NAD. He wanted to be sure that we would be happy having Debra Brill handle Deaf Ministry issues within the NAD. I felt humbled that the NAD President cared enough to be sure of ADM's support before making a decision which affected the Deaf work.

We were even more impressed when Debra Brill and ADM planned a special 3-day meeting for some NAD church leaders to interact with Deaf SDA leaders. Since Don had a busy schedule, he had planned to attend only the first 2 hours of these meetings. But Don became very interested in our discussions, especially when he learned that SDA church was not #1 in Deaf membership. So he had his secretary cancel everything on his schedule for that afternoon and the next 2 days. He did, however, have one special committee meeting that he had to attend. And he apologized to us for his brief absence. But he joined us for the rest of the meetings.

When our 3-day event was finished, Don offered to set-up a guided tour of the NAD

headquarters. He then asked us Deaf leaders if we wanted one of the normal tour leaders or if we wanted to have him lead the tour. All the Deaf participants wanted Don show us around the NAD. As Don lead the tour, he introduced us to various church leaders and he would ask them if they knew how many Deaf SDA members and various other facts he had learned during our 3-day meeting. That showed us Deaf leaders that Don REALLY listened and what he learned had touched his heart.

At the end of the NAD tour, Don invited us to his office and autographed copies of his book for each of us: "One Heart Rejoicing: The Difference Jesus Makes". I still have my copy with the note he wrote on the inside cover: "Jim, God is using you. He has big plans for you and the deaf work. Don Schneider"

Don Schneider truly impressed us and I wish more of our hearing church leaders had Don's kind of open mind, tender heart and full support of an indepedent Deaf Ministry (ADM) being run by Deaf leaders. If only more hearing church leaders would take the time to sincerely listen to Deaf members, put Deaf members in control of meetings related to Deaf Ministry, and realize that their ideas are not necessarilly the best solutions for Deaf church growth, then Deaf membership might begin to grow.

We look forward to seeing Don again on the blessed Resurrection Day!
