Thanks to the Southern New England Conference for allowing the Deaf Reach seminar to use its facility for making the program to work productively. Also, thanks to Linda, Jessica's mom for preparing food for the attendees and David, Jessica's husband for assistance.

The Deaf Reach seminar has been inactive since the successful trainings were given to several Deaf groups and church all over the country, including Canada. The last Deaf Reach seminar was conducted about ten years ago.

The Speaker's Message: Farewell

This is my last report as the Speaker/Director. My position ended when the new Speaker/Director, Paul Kelly, started his job on October 1, 2021. It is hard to believe that I have worked for 3ADM for more than 14 years as the Speaker/Director the job I had never dreamed of. However, in addition to 3ADM I had worked for the Potomac Conference as the full-time pastor for the Deaf for 7 years, CRS as Associate Director for 6 years and Adventist Deaf Ministries (after the closure of Deaf Department in CRS) as Associate Director for 2 years. That means I have worked for the Lord in these capacities for over 29 years. What God hath wrought!

Of course, the pastor never retires. But almost like the ballad that General Arthur MacArthur who was 71 years old gave his closing farewell to the Congress in 1951. " 'Old soldiers never die—they just fade away.' And like the old soldier of that ballad, I now close my military career and just fade away—an old soldier who tried to do his duty as God gave him the light to see that duty. Good-bye." Christians are soldiers in the spiritual warfare. Old pastors in sense never die, but just fade away in the background.

My retirement come with happiness and sadness. Happiness is because I have done my duties for Jesus Christ thus ending my administrative work so it relieves me from the burden of the difficult tasks for the younger generation to take over. Sadness is because I will miss the ministry that have reached out to many Deaf people, SDAs and non-SDAs all over the world. Francisca and I will never die in the spirit of love for the Deaf and in the passion for sharing with the Deaf. We will continue what the

Lord has planned for us. We will not be inactive for sure! Some of you might think that we will go bird watching all the time. That is not the truth. Of course, we will spend more time in birding but not neglecting the lay gospel work for the Deaf. We will have more freedom in spending more time out of the office environment in reaching out to the Deaf—just like my former pastoral work that I loved the most. Deaf souls are precious to us, and we want them to have the thrilling experience of knowing the truths in the Bible and learning more about Jesus Christ as we had experienced when we were students at Gallaudet University which was the turning point of our lives—the best ever we had experienced. Let me emphasize it—it is the ultimate life-changing experience we ever had in our whole life. So, that is why we want them to experience it as Jesus promises, "I came that they may have life and have it abundantly" (John 10:10).

I appreciate the consideration of the Board for allowing me to continue my employment until April 30 to smoothly assist the transition of my responsibilities to Paul Kelly and to prepare Francisca and me to relocate in spring of 2022. We have not decided on the new location for our retirement. We need your prayers.

We are praying to God for His guidance on where to relocate as we still have the heart to continue the service of God for the Deaf. I am asking you to pray for Paul Kelly as he is learning the ropes of the administration of the ministry, and for us as we are slowly closing our work for this viable Deaf ministry. Thank you!

Amazing God During House Hunting

After accepting an offer to be the next Director/Speaker of Three Angels Deaf Ministries (3ADM) last February (a new job started on October 1), we were suggested to move to the DC metropolitan area or remain in Rochester, NY if it could be worked out successfully. During that time, the price of wood and the price of houses for sale rose dramatically across the country. Our realtor informed us that 65% of people were not selling their homes due to the COVID-19 pandemic, so there were not many houses for sale. Although the interest rate was low, the buyers including the realtor's clients were having a hard time finding a house to buy. Many houses were sold so quickly at a much higher price. There were people with cash chasing after any house they could find to buy. We were concerned about the house cost continuing to rise if we waited until summer or fall to look for a house to buy. We spent time searching on the Internet and receiving information from our realtor for an affordable house to buy, especially the one to have a room for the 3ADM office to run from home. Many houses were expensive forcing us to narrow down our search to the Hagerstown area and nearby cities in Maryland. We found six houses to explore. We also looked into the possibility of buying a new home. We left the matter to God to decide where we should live, either in Maryland or in Rochester, NY to carry out 3ADM mission.

On our school spring break during the last week of March of 2021, we drove down to Hagerstown in Maryland which is 5 ½ hours' drive south of Rochester, NY. We stayed at our Adventist friends' home during our house hunting. Upon arrival, we stopped by to see the new homes. We found out that many people were also quickly buying new homes. We were told that we would have to wait many months for a new home to be ready. One builder said that the waiting list would be up to two years. With that news, we decided to go for older homes. We drove by six houses the next day on Tuesday before we met our realtor on Wednesday. By then, the realtor learned that three houses were not ready to be seen inside even though they were advertised as "coming soon." That left us with only three houses instead of six. One of them was a bit out of the way so only two houses were to be seen afterwards. The first one was nice, but the price was rather high. It was built in the 1960s and

there wasn't much renovation being done. We then went to the last house. While visiting that house, we noticed a flower-decorated cross on the wall near the door in the porch area. It was set up because Easter was coming up that week. Also, a picture of Jesus holding a lamb was on the wall above the basement stairway, so we assumed that it was a Christian home. While we went through the house, the realtor called me over to the master bedroom to show me the plaques and certificates hanging on the wall. We noticed that the owner was a chaplain. Then I went to the basement. There were bookcases filled with books. My eyes caught the red-and-green Bible Commentary, a ten volume set, which was old Seventh-day Adventist books. Then I saw Ellen G. White books too. Instantly, I knew that the owner was obviously a Seventh-day Adventist. Then I saw a picture of him and his wife in his office. I called my wife Tina over and asked if she knew him. She remembered his name back in the 1970s. That was about 44 years ago. He had a Deaf brother and a Deaf sister. His Deaf brother used to be a member of the Silver Spring Deaf Church back then and is now living in Pennsylvania. At that time during the summer of 1977, his Deaf brother invited Tina when she was a single to visit his brother and his family in Wisconsin. This was when his brother was a manager of a bread company before he became a pastor later.

Later in the evening, I called his Deaf brother and had a chat before asking him for his brother's contact number. He didn't know the reason for the call. Then the following morning on Thursday, I called his brother and told him that I would be the 3ADM Director in the fall and while we chatted, he began to remember Tina and other people he associated with because of his Deaf brother. We told him that we happened to come across his house during our house hunt and were interested in his house. Later in the afternoon, he called us inviting us and our Adventist friends out to the Olive Garden Restaurant. We all had a good chat. He informed us that since his house was put up for sale on Tuesday, there were more than 24 people who saw his house and three more were scheduled to see it on Friday morning. Also, more than 7 people were trying to bid for his house. He mentioned that one person refused to be outbid and had cash ready to buy his house. By the end

of dinner, he stated that he would like to sell us his house if everything went well with the paperwork which was due by Friday noon. We contacted our realtor who was very surprised. We both then worked hard preparing the paperwork that night and Friday morning through texting and emails. We made it in time by submitting our paperwork.

Our Adventist friends and we then went out to Mozzarella, a completely Deaf-owned pizzeria in DC near where Gallaudet University is. Later that day, we finally got confirmation that the house was sold to us! Praise God! We could see that God is at work to make things happen according to His will. What's more, the owner bought that house from the first owner who happened to be an Adventist classmate of his wife back then. They didn't know that until two months later! The first owner, the second owner, and us being the third were all Adventists!

On Sabbath after the church service, a group of Adventists, including our son and his wife, had a potluck at the Great Falls Park in Virginia. They were so anxious to hear the outcome of our

house hunting, especially that we had a short week in the midst of a crazed house snatching going on. After potluck, they all sat down to listen to our house hunting story. They felt goosebumps on their arms and praised God for how amazing He is.

The experience taught us all the importance of submitting to God's will first and trusting Him that His will be done when we ask him for anything. John the Apostle stated in 1 John 5:14, "Now this is the confidence that we have in Him, that if we ask anything according to His will, He hears us." We want to thank God and our people who prayed for us.

Tina and I finally retired from the Rochester School for the Deaf where we worked for many years. Now we have a new chapter of life serving our Lord. Let us all pray and work together to spread the gospel and to announce the wonderful news of Christ's return to take us all to our permanent home! Amen!

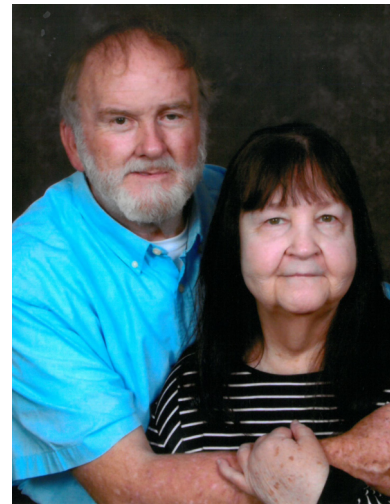

We meet this faithful brother at our yearly camp-meetings surrounded by several of his mute converts. Someone who is interested, who has ears to hear, writes out some

portion of the discourse, and he sits surrounded by his mute friends actively preaching to them with his hands. He has freely used his means to advance the missionary work, thus honoring God with his substance. By and by, if faithful, he will receive a precious reward. Twenty-two received baptism." Testimonies for the Church, vol. 4, page 300.

DEAR Camp Meeting 2021



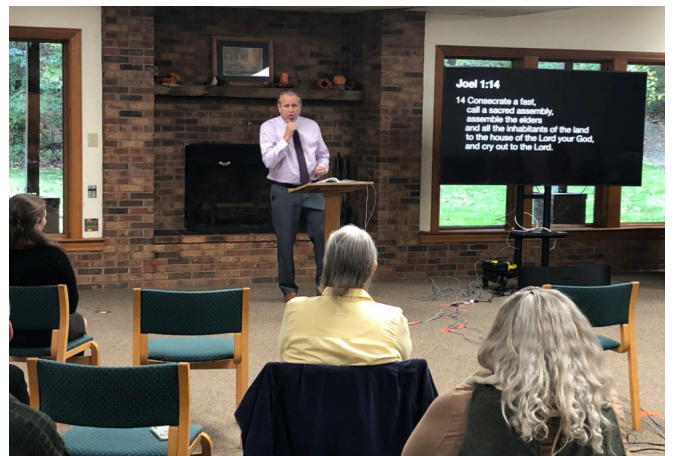

And, they really need someone like us to give a sermon and encouragement to foster their spiritual growth. After a good brunch I gave a
