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The Messianic Prophecies in the Old Testament

The Bible has many predictions or prophecies about what God would do for His people and what would happen in the future based on the battle between Christ and Satan. God knows the end from the beginning. God wants us to know the prophecies that give us hope and encouragement when things happen. He doesn't always give the prophecies of good news, but He allows us to see the bad things to happen so we would not be afraid. Here is a good verse of what God would do before things to happen. Amos 3:7 says: "The Lord

and King never does anything without telling his servants the prophets about it." That shows God always wants to communicate with His people about His plan of salvation, Messiah, judgment, warnings, etc.

According to J. Barton Payne's *Encyclopedia of Biblical Prophecy* there are 1,239 prophecies in the Old Testament and 578 prophecies in the New Testament, for a total of 1,817. These come from 8,352 verses. How many prophecies about Jesus Christ in the Old Testament? We don't have the exact number but some

counted 351, while another claimed 315. So, we could say that there are at least 300 Messianic prophecies in the Old Testament. That is about over ¼ of the Old Testament prophecies. Clearly, this shows that Messianic prophecies are very important! We need to know who He is and what He would do for us.

We cannot give you all of the Messianic prophecies and fulfillments because of limited space. So here are a few prophecies relating to Christ. Remember some of the prophecies were given more than a thousand years before the fulfillment through Christ's life on earth.

Moses wrote about Christ—Deuteronomy 18:15, NKJV—“The Lord your God will raise up for you a Prophet like me from your midst, from your brethren. Him you shall hear, . . .”

Peter talked about Christ when he mentioned the prophecy given by Moses. Acts 3:22-24, NKJV—“For Moses truly said to the fathers, ‘The Lord your God will raise up for you a Prophet like me from your brethren. Him you shall hear in all things, whatever He says to you. And it shall be *that*

every soul who will not hear that Prophet shall be utterly destroyed from among the people.’ Yes, and all the prophets, from Samuel and those who follow, as many as have spoken, have also foretold these days.”

Isaiah foretold the birth of Christ by a virgin. Isaiah 7:14, NKJV—“Therefore the Lord Himself will give you a sign: Behold, the virgin shall conceive and bear a Son, and shall call His name Immanuel.” The following text shows the fulfillment of Isaiah 7:14. Matthew 1:22, 23, NKJV—“So all this was done that it might be fulfilled which was spoken by the Lord through the prophet, saying: ‘Behold, the virgin shall be with child, and bear a Son, and they shall call His name Immanuel,’ which is translated, “God with us.” ’ ”

Micah the prophet said that Messiah would be born at Bethlehem. Micah 5:2, NKJV—“But you, Bethlehem Ephrathah, *Though* you are little among the thousands of Judah, *Yet* out of you shall come forth to Me The One to be Ruler in Israel, Whose goings forth *are* from of old, From everlasting.” Five hundred years later Jesus was actually born in Bethlehem

instead of Nazareth as prophesied in Micah. Jesus' parents originally lived in Nazareth when Mary was pregnant with Jesus before they were forced to go to Bethlehem for tax registration. It was one of the amazing prophecies!

Isaiah again told that someone would prepare the way for the Lord. Isaiah 40:3, NKJV—"The voice of one crying in the wilderness: 'Prepare the way of the Lord; Make straight in the desert a highway for our God.'" Then many years later disciple John wrote: "Now this is the testimony of John, when the Jews sent priests and Levites from Jerusalem to ask him, 'Who are you?' . . . "He said: 'I [John the Baptist] am "The voice of one crying in the wilderness: Make straight the way of the Lord," 'as the prophet Isaiah said' " (John 1:19, 23, NKJV).

Isaiah who was called the Messianic prophet declared: "The Spirit of the Lord and King is on me. The Lord has anointed me to announce good news to poor people. He has sent me to comfort those whose hearts have been broken. He has sent me to announce freedom for those

who have been captured. He wants me to set prisoners free from their dark cells" (Isaiah 61:1). A Gentile follower of Jesus, Luke, wrote about the fulfillment of Isaiah's prophecy. "Jesus went to Nazareth, where he had been brought up. On the Sabbath day he went into the synagogue as he usually did. He stood up to read. And the scroll of Isaiah the prophet was handed to him. Jesus unrolled it and found the right place. There it is written, "The Spirit of the Lord is on me. He has anointed me to announce the good news to poor people. He has sent me to announce freedom for prisoners. He has sent me so that the blind will see again. He wants me to set free those who are treated badly. . . . Then Jesus rolled up the scroll. He gave it back to the attendant and sat down. The eyes of everyone in the synagogue were staring at him. He began by saying to them, "Today this passage of Scripture is coming true [fulfilled] as you listen" (Luke 4:16-21).

Isaiah showed how people rejected the Messiah. "People looked down on him. They didn't accept him. He knew all about pain and suffering.

He was like someone people turn their faces away from. We looked down on him. We didn't have any respect for him" (Isaiah 53:3). Now disciple John's word shows the fulfillment of Isaiah's prophecy. John 1:10, 11—"The Word [Jesus] was in the world. And the world was made through him. But the world did not recognize him. He came to what was his own. But his own people did not accept him."

There are several prophecies about Jesus' trial, crucifixion, burial and resurrection.

1. Isaiah's definition of the Messiah's humble behavior toward those who treated Him badly at the trial. "He was treated badly and made to suffer. But he didn't open his mouth. He was led away like a lamb to be killed. Sheep are silent while their wool is being cut off. In the same way, he didn't open his mouth" (Isaiah 53:7). Matthew told of the story about the trial that shows the fulfillment of Isaiah's prophecy. "Then Pilate asked him, "Don't you hear the charges they are bringing against you?" But Jesus made no reply, not even to a single charge. The governor was really amazed"

(Matthew 27:13, 14).

2. King David's prophecy of the Messiah's clothes. "They divide My garments among them, And for My clothing they cast lots" (Psalm 22:18, NKJV). Here is Matthew's story that fulfilled David's prophecy. "Then they crucified Him, and divided His garments, casting lots, that it might be fulfilled which was spoken by the prophet: "They divided My garments among them, And for My clothing they cast lots" (Matthew 27:35, NKJV).

3. Here is another prophecy about the Messiah's suffering on the cross. Psalm 69:21, NKJV—"They also gave me gall for my food, And for my thirst they gave me vinegar to drink." What did happen when Jesus was on the cross? "They gave Him sour wine mingled with gall to drink. But when He had tasted *it*, He would not drink" (Matthew 27:34, NKJV).

4. With whom did the prophet Isaiah say Christ would make His grave? "And they made His grave with the wicked—But with the rich at His death" (Isaiah 53:9, NKJV). Matthew told about two other persons who were crucified with Jesus.

Matthew 27:38, NKJV—“Then two robbers were crucified with Him, one on the right and another on the left.”

Was the last part of Isaiah 53:9—“But with the rich at His death” fulfilled? Yes, see Matthew 27:57-60—“Now when evening had come, there came a *rich* man from Arimathea, named Joseph, who himself had also become a disciple of Jesus. This man went to Pilate and asked for the body of Jesus. Then Pilate commanded the body to be given to him. When Joseph had taken the body, he wrapped it in a clean linen cloth, and laid it in his new tomb which he had hewn out of the rock; . . .”

5. Did Jesus stay in the grave forever? No, here is the prophecy of Christ’s burial and resurrection. “For You will not leave my soul in Sheol [grave], Nor will You allow Your Holy One to see corruption [decay]” (Psalm 16:10, NKJV). Mark told of one of the greatest of all of Messianic prophecies found in Mark 16:4-6, NKJV—“But when they looked up, they saw that the stone had been rolled away—for it was very large. And entering the tomb, they saw a young man clothed

in a long white robe sitting on the right side; and they were alarmed. But he said to them, “Do not be alarmed. You seek Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. He is risen! He is not here. See the place where they laid Him.”

Now, we know for sure that the Bible is trustworthy and true because of the fulfillment of the Messianic prophecies. Jesus Christ is the true Messiah as prophesied in the Old Testament that was fulfilled in the life of Jesus Christ. Praise the Lord! We know that Jesus will come again soon because He said so and His words will come true as fulfilled when He returns back to earth to take us to heaven. “Do not let your hearts be troubled. You believe in God. Believe in me also. There are many rooms in my Father’s house. If this were not true, would I have told you that I am going there? Would I have told you that I would prepare a place for you there? If I go and do that, I will come back. And I will take you to be with me. Then you will also be where I am” (John 14:1-3).

Will you be there when Jesus comes back again? Please do!

The Armor of God

I'm sure most of you are familiar with the "Armor of God" which is in Paul's letter to Ephesians. The specific verses are found in Ephesians 6:11-18. Have you ever wondered how certain pieces of armor are connected to something spiritually?

Ephesians 6:11-13 explains the purpose of wearing the whole armor of God. It is to guard against the "wiles of devil" and "withstand in the evil day" (NKJV). The first two pieces of armor are found in the fourteenth verse—the belt of truth and the breastplate

of righteousness. There are six pieces of armor (a pair of shoes counts as one), and they are symbolical—not to be taken literally. Paul used the Roman military armor as a symbol of how a person can walk in Christ against our spiritual enemies.

The Belt of Truth

The first armor piece is the belt of truth. What is truth? More importantly, who is the Truth? Jesus Christ Himself as He says in my personal favorite verse, John 14:6: "I am the way, the truth, and the life." Once we know Truth, we need to hold fast

to Him. What happens when we forget about Jesus? We will fall in the same way as if we are wearing loose pants without a belt to hold them. We need Jesus so we would avoid falling into darkness of despair and hopelessness.

The Breastplate of Righteousness

The next piece is the breastplate of righteousness. We know for the fact that the breastplate protects us from any harm done to our body, like a bulletproof vest for police officers, but how does that connect to righteousness? Righteousness is an act and/or attitude of doing or thinking of something right to other people and God (Isaiah 1:17). As long as we practice righteousness, the breastplate will protect us from the bullets of wrongful actions or thoughts.

The Shoes of Preparation for the Gospel of Peace

This may be the most interesting piece of armor because it has two spiritual things: gospel and peace. Why do we wear shoes? Isn't there an obvious answer

to that question? To walk on rough pavements, of course! We need good shoes in order to walk in Christ. Good shoes mean having the right attitude. A true Christian would be prepared to spread Good News (Gospel of Jesus) and be in peace with Christ. We need peace to bring "glad tidings" and the gospel brings peaceful messages. Both work together, like a complete pair of shoes for each foot. "For we are His workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand that we should walk in them" (Ephesians 2:10).

The Shield of Faith

Ephesians 6:16, NCV, points out: "And also use the shield of faith with which you can stop all the burning arrows of the Evil One." This verse is clear that we need to shield our faith in Christ and resist those "fiery darts" that would cause us to lose our faith in Him. Having faith protects us from being fooled by worldly things that separate us from God. The Helmet of Salvation
It is true that we receive

salvation by accepting Jesus into our heart, but why a helmet for salvation? When a person says that he has accepted Jesus into his heart he actually accepts Him into our mind. Heart represents our mind. We need to have Jesus Christ in our mind/heart and believe that He is the only source of salvation (Philippians 2:5). Also, Jesus is the head of the church (Colossians 1:18).

The Sword of Spirit

There is a perfect verse for this spiritual piece that is found in Hebrews 4:12: “The word of God is alive and active. It is sharper than any sword that has two edges. It cuts deep enough to separate soul from spirit. It can separate bones from joints. It judges the thoughts and purposes of the heart.” A sword can be either used as something to attack or defend something with. What is the word of God? The Holy Bible. Who guided people’s writings in the Book? The Holy Spirit. We need to be sure that we are speaking God’s Word through the Holy Spirit. Jesus used the sword three times to defeat devil’s

temptations during his forty days of fasting and praying by using the words: “It is written...”

Pray in the Spirit

It is very important to remember that we must pray when we have the armor of God. Here is about prayer: “Praying always with all prayer and supplication in the Spirit, being watchful to this end with all perseverance and supplication for all the saints” (Ephesians 6:18). What is the most basic and important thing we need to do while battling for Christ? We pray! It is the important part of our daily walk with Christ. We need to pray for those spiritual armors in order to stand fast and strong with Jesus and be as righteous as He is. Let us not forget to pray for the armor of God everyday!

“Be sober, be vigilant; because your adversary the devil walks about like a roaring lion, seeking whom he may devour” (1 Peter 5:8).

Our heavenly Father watches and cares for us with love. He sees us when we go to work, when we pray, when we are sleeping at night, and when we wake up in the morning. God sees the rich person who has more food than he [rich

person] needs, and the poor person who has only a little food. God sees all the tears and all the smiles.

If we fully believe God cares, we will stop worrying. We will leave everything to God, who knows how to solve all our problems. Then we will have peace that many people do not have.

The Bible tells us more about God's character than nature tells us. The Bible tells how God works with people, and about the plan of salvation. The Bible tells us stories of prophets and other holy people who lived years ago. They were "the same kind of person[s]

as we are" (James 5:17). They became discouraged the same as we become discouraged. They also sinned. But they overcame their sins through the grace of God. The stories of these people give us courage as we try to overcome sin. We read of the wonderful experiences God gave them. We learn that they enjoyed knowing God, and that they did a great work through His grace. The Holy Spirit encourages us to follow their example and be faithful to God.

Jesus was talking about the Old Testament when He said, " 'These very Scriptures speak about Me' " (John 5:39). The New Testament also tells about Jesus. The whole Bible tells about Jesus. The Bible says Jesus created all things, "Not one thing in all creation was made without Him" (John 1:3).

The Bible also says Jesus promised to come back to earth. " 'I [Jesus] am coming soon!' " (Revelation 22:12). When we read the Bible, we are reading about Jesus' work and listening

to His voice. If you want to know Jesus, study the Bible.

We must fill our minds with the words of God. The Bible is compared to springs of living water for a thirsty person. The Bible represents living bread from heaven. Jesus said, “ ‘If you do not eat the flesh of the Son of Man [Jesus] and drink His blood, you will not have life in yourselves.’ ” Then Jesus explained the meaning of His words: “ ‘The words I have spoken to you bring God’s life-giving [Holy] Spirit’ ” (John 6:53, 63).

Our bodies grow and receive strength from the things we eat and drink. Our spiritual life grows and receives strength from reading the Bible and thinking about the Bible’s inspiring messages.

Heavenly angels love to study the plan of salvation. Saved people in heaven will study the story of salvation forever. They will sing the song of salvation. People should carefully study the story of salvation now. Jesus’ mercy, love, and sacrifice are important to study. We should think often

about Jesus’ character. We should think about Jesus’ work as our priest in heaven to save His people from sin.

As we think about spiritual themes, our faith and love will become stronger. Then our prayers will be more and more acceptable to God. Then our prayers will have more faith and love. Our prayers will be intelligent and more effective. We will trust Jesus fully and will experience His power to save us from our sins.

When we think about our perfect Saviour, we will desire to be changed and have Jesus’ pure character. The more we think about Jesus, the more we will tell other people about Him. People will see Jesus in us.

The Bible was written for all people—people who are educated and people with no education. The truths needed for salvation are written so clearly everyone can understand the truths. Any person who does the will of God and not his own will, will be saved.

We must study the Bible ourselves. We should not let other people tell us what

the Bible means. If we allow other people to do our thinking, our minds will lose the ability to understand the deep meaning of the Bible.

The mind will grow stronger if we study the Bible. We must study the Bible and compare one verse with another verse. Then we will understand the Bible better.

Studying the Bible strengthens the intellect. No other book is so powerful to help us think of spiritual things, and to give energy to the mind. If people studied the Bible properly, they would have well-balanced minds, better characters, and a purpose for living. Very few people have these qualities.

Reading the Bible quickly does not benefit a person very much. A person can read every word in the Bible and not understand the deep, hidden meanings. Carefully study one verse at a time. Study the same verse until you understand the relation to the plan of salvation. Keep your Bible with you. As you have a chance, read the

Bible. Try to remember the verses. Read a verse and think about the verse while walking from place to place. Thinking about the verse will help you remember the verse.

To have wisdom, we must carefully study the Bible and pray. Some parts of the Bible are so clear that all people can understand the meaning. But other parts of the Bible must be studied very carefully. Compare Bible verse with Bible verse. We must study carefully and ask God to help us understand. Then God will bless our study.

A miner searches for gold hidden deep in the ground. A person who carefully searches the Bible will be the same as a miner. He will find and learn more about the great truths of the Bible. A person who does not study the Bible carefully will not learn the great truths. God's words are compared to streams of water flowing into our minds from the fountain of life.

We should always pray before we study the Bible. Ask the Holy Spirit to guide

your study, then open the Bible. The Holy Spirit will guide.

The disciple Nathanael came to Jesus. Jesus said, “ ‘Here is a real Israelite; there is nothing false in him!’ Nathanael asked Him [Jesus], ‘How do you know me?’ Jesus answered, ‘I saw you when you were under the fig tree before Philip called you’ ” (John 1:47, 48).

Jesus sees and hears us when we pray and ask for help to understand truth. Angels from heaven will help us when we ask God to guide our thoughts.

The Holy Spirit honors Jesus. The Holy Spirit helps

us know Jesus’ greatness. The Holy Spirit shows us Jesus’ pure righteousness and how Jesus saves us. Jesus said, “ ‘He [Holy Spirit] will take what I say and tell it to you’ ” (John 16:14). The Holy Spirit is the teacher who can best help us understand God’s truth.

Think how much God loves us! God gave His Son, Jesus, to die for us. Then God sent His Holy Spirit to teach us and guide us.

Actually, Abraham read the Bible that had a powerful influence on him.

Florence Nightingale

worked hard as a great nurse. She was known as “The Lady with the Lamp” because she checked around the wounded soldiers at night. Florence always believed that God had called her to serve other people. Her virtue was to help and serve other people when they needed her help. Her mother and sister were against the idea of Florence working as a nurse. She refused to agree with her mother and sister to live in a comfortable and wealthy life. Florence had a boyfriend, but she thought that the marriage would prevent her ability to follow her calling in a nurse position. Back in the history in Europe, there were 4,077 soldiers who died from diseases due to poor sanitary (lack of cleanliness) rules. When Florence went to the war as a nurse the diseases were wiped out due to cleanliness and improved ventilation. The numbers of death suddenly dropped. Her virtue was that she thought of the needs of the wounded soldiers by practicing clean sanitary rules and offering right nutrition to help the soldiers. People honored her for her work in establishing a nursing school. Everyone loved her for her strong stand for doing right thing for other people.

David Livingstone was

greatly influenced by a missionary, Robert Moffat. David was inspired to go to China as a missionary, but things turned out bad due to war there. Then he had the motivation to go to Africa. Yes, he had experienced the opposition from his family. David was kind and eager to share God’s Word with the people in Africa. Many Africans loved David so much for his kindness and helpfulness for many years. He died at the age of 60. David had a great virtue in his love for the people who knew no gospel in the great continent of Africa.

Lastly, Jesus Christ wants us to have, at least, a virtue. Philippians 4:8: “Finally, brothers, whatever things are true, whatever things are honest, whatever things are just, whatever things are pure, whatever things are lovely, whatever things are of good report, if there is any **virtue**, and if there is any praise, think on these things.”

2 Peter 1:5: “For this reason make every effort to add **virtue** to your faith; and to your **virtue** knowledge.” Jesus Christ is our Hope and Creator. We need Jesus Christ’s **virtue** to supplement our weak character and faith.

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
