Janice also wants everyone to know: "We are a Deaf family!"

On the weekend of April 26-28, the D.E.A.F. ministries held its annual DEAF Weekend in Worcester, Massachusetts. Pastor Jeff Jordan who was the guest speaker had the privilege of baptizing Janice.

From the Speaker: The Cracks on the Wall

In April, more than 1,000 dead bodies and hundreds of injured people were pulled from a collapsed eight storied factory building in Bangladesh. Why did this happen? Simply, the factory managers ignored the police's order. The police saw new, deep cracks on the building's walls. They ordered that the building be evacuated. Because managers told the 2,000 workers that the building was safe, they stayed.

Question: why did the factory managers ignore the police's order to evacuate from the weakened building? Answer: greed and selfishness. Managers feared that an evacuation would cause the business to lose money. They thought maybe the warning was false and there was nothing to worry about. They had confidence in the building. Yes, even after seeing the deep cracks.

But sadly, the police were right. The police cared for the workers' lives and safety. The business owners and managers were interested in making money and did not care for the safety of the many workers.

This reminds me of our very patient God who warns us about the deep cracks in our lives. Do we just ignore Him? Are we blind to our cracks, thinking we are okay and nothing will happen to us? The warnings and signs are obvious and cannot be overlooked. But often, we put our faith in ourselves and faulty human ideas.

Jesus warned: "But everyone who hears these sayings of Mine, and does not do them, will be like a foolish man who built his house on the sand: and the rain descended, the floods came, and the winds blew and beat on that house; and it fell. And great was its fall." (Matthew 7:26, 27). Are we like the house built on the sand?

God's prophets are like the police who give warnings to members and non-members of the church. The members of the church are no different from non-members because both groups of people are sinners who are totally weak from sin. Both need God's grace for salvation and God's law for safety in the dark world filled with cracks.

We should not ignore the cracks. They are a sign of trouble that will come if we do not pay attention. Cracks are not normal. What are the cracks? Sin, which is not normal. But we accept sin as if they are normal. We enjoy sinful lives as if we will not be hurt at all! If we continue to ignore the tell-tale signs (cracks) we surely will suffer destruction. 1 Thessalonians 5:2, 3 – "For you yourselves know perfectly that the day of the Lord so comes as a thief in the night. For when they say, "Peace and safety!" then sudden destruction comes upon them, as labor pains upon a pregnant woman.

And they shall not escape."

When the factory started to collapse, it was too late for the workers to escape. In the same way, if we continue to ignore the Bible's warning, instruction, and encouragement we will be lost eternally. To be lost eternally is definitely worse than to die in a collapsed building!

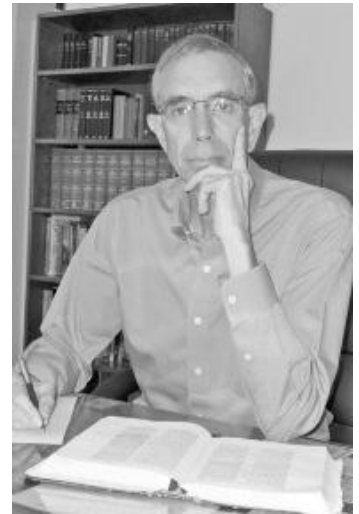
So, how do we know what exactly the cracks are?

You can easily find them in the Bible. You can find the Ten Commandments in Exodus 20. As you read them, think about whether or not you follow each one. Breaking the Ten Commandments is a sure sign that you have cracks in your life. But the cracks (sin) starts in your mind. Remember, Jesus made it clear that what you think in your mind is who you are. Sinful thoughts cause sinful actions. The cracks (sin) are symptoms that our relationship with the Lord is not good.

I have met many Christians who say, "God understands if I continue my bad habits. God is forgiving and will not throw me out of heaven." Is that true? Why did Jesus tell the woman caught in adultery to go and sin no more (John 8:2-11)?

Did Paul teach that grace is a license to sin more? No. "What shall we say then? Shall we continue in sin that grace may abound? Certainly not! How shall we who died to sin live any longer in it? . . . What then? Shall we sin because we are not under law but under grace? Certainly not! (Romans 6:1, 2, 15 NKJV).

Jesus is our example. Jesus never sinned while living in this dirty, old world. He kept Himself pure through obedience to the Father through FAITH. There were NO cracks in His life. We are safe as long as we are in Christ. Being "in Christ" means we surrender ourselves to Him by FAITH. FAITH means more than just belief in Him. FAITH is putting ourselves in God's care and control. FAITH is walking with God daily. Let us be like the wise man who built his house on the rock (Jesus). The house will not collapse because it is on the foundation of God's word and truth.

The ladies of the church worked hard to prepare a yummy, healthy lunch. Everyone seemed to have a great time visiting with each other, walking, and playing volleyball and other games.

In Memory: Alyce Griffith

On July 11, 2013, Alyce Griffith, passed away peacefully of natural causes. Alyce was 92 years old. Alyce Griffith was born at Grandma McNeal's home in Vancouver, Washington on June 20, 1921. She was the 2nd child of Ross Jacob and Margaret Grove.

One of Alyce's characteristics was loyalty. Challenges such as deafness and a life of hardship and hard work did not prevent her from giving her life in service to God, to her parents, her husband and her children. Someone asked her why she continued to go to church when there was no interpreter. She said, "I go there to met Jesus."

Alyce attended Oregon School for the Deaf in Salem. She also attended the Cedar Creek Adventist Church School. There her teacher and students learned sign language.

In July 1942, she met her husband-to-be on the Seventh-day Adventist Gladstone campgrounds. But it was not love at first sight. In fact, at first she showed no interest in him. One day Arthur had asked her out for a date playing tennis, which she agreed to. When Arthur went to the tennis court he was surprised to see her playing tennis with another handsome man.

Later, Alyce and Arthur were engaged on February, 1944. The next morning her fiancé (Arthur) came to the Portland Sanitarium hospital where she was working in the cafeteria. She was very surprised to see him covered with band-aids. On his way home after they were engaged, he had slid on ice into the ditch.

Their wedding on April 16, 1944 was financed with a \$200.00 loan. This meant that there would be no honeymoon. She did not complain.

The war economy made Alyce a very frugal person the rest of her life. She made clothes last longer with her sewing skills. She loved hard work so much that her children wished she would slow down. Summers were filled with getting firewood, gardening, and canning fruits and vegetables.

Early in the morning, Alyce and the children would all be out in the fields picking to earn money for clothes and books for the coming school year. Since Alyce could pick

faster than any of the children, she would put Doris in a crib box which one of the kids would take turns dragging down the rows.

Alyce loved to make homemade bread. When the family went camping at Crater Lake two of the older boys had to sleep outside beside the car because there was not enough room in the tent. Alyce had left the trunk of the car open. During the night a bear got into the trunk but only ate two of the 4 loaves. You guessed it – those two loaves were homemade bread.

God gave Alyce an attitude that allowed her to smile a lot. One day their VW could not quite make it up the snowy hill near their home in Cedar Creek. Alyce got out to push when suddenly the car took off and Arthur kept going for fear he could not get going again. Because there were not many VWs on the road in those days Alyce was very surprised when a VW went by her in the opposite direction with what looked like her husband and another woman. After Arthur showed up with their 4-wheel drive jeep they both had a good laugh.

We look forward to the day, when with healthy minds and bodies, we may praise God forever for many things, including Mothers. Thank you God for the hope of being with loved ones and all His children.

Alyce is survived by her siblings: Ellen Beck and Roland Grove: her children, Alfred Griffith, Don Griffith, Ben Griffith and Doris Regen.
