SHERRY WAGNER'S INSPIRING TESTIMONY.

I grew up a Seventh-day Adventist (SDA) and my father, Silas Wagner, had a love for God and the Bible. He shared the gospel wherever he went and I often interpreted for him in church until my hearing became increasingly challenging to understand the pastor. This was before I had hearing aids. As I grew up, I wanted to be baptized, but was repeatedly told no and that the timing wasn't right. I wanted to attend an SDA academy, but it was too costly.

It seemed like everything I tried to do was met with setbacks. I started to lose faith in the possibility of being baptized and becoming a member of the SDA Church. During this time, I stayed home and watched 3ADM sermons since it was a challenge hearing the sermons in church. I prayed every day for an opportunity to be baptized and fully embrace the SDA faith.

Eventually, I received new hearing aids, and a turning point came when Esther Doss reached out to me. She invited me to attend the SDF Deaf Camp Meeting and I was so excited to go. I'm now a member of Ozark Ark SDA church. The church provided a special hearing device to help me in listening to the sermons. Sabbath classes remained a bit challenging to follow without the hearing device.

Esther Doss played a big role in my journey. She seemed to open doors for me, and I waited 40 years to be baptized. I consider her a blessing sent by God. I had known Esther since childhood, and she felt like a sister I never had for twenty years. We had lost touch due to us having own families, but we always found our way back to each other. I admired her dedication to Deaf ministry despite her busy life as a wife and mother.

Meanwhile, I faced my own challenges as a single mother raising four kids, two of whom had ADHD. This journey was incredibly demanding and exhausting. Around three or four years ago, I reconnected with Esther at her church in Mountain View, Arkansas. Esther and my father taught me valuable lessons.

Finally, the moment I had waited for arrived. At the GA Deaf Camp, Kathy McCain encouraged me to speak with Pastor Jeff Jordan about baptism. Nervous but determined, I approached him and took a step toward fulfilling my lifelong desire. I am deeply grateful for this remarkable gift, as God has been my true Savior, mentor, and father. My connection with Him has grown stronger than ever before and I continue to learn new things about God and the Bible.

In Memoriam: Remembering Debra Brill, a Dedicated Leader in NAD Deaf Ministry



It is with a heavy heart that we share the news of the passing of Debra Brill, the former Vice President for Ministries of the North American Division. On August 27, 2023, she peacefully found her rest at her residence in Jamaica, Virginia, from a long period of illness. She leaves behind a legacy at the age of 71.

When the Christian Record Services voted to close its department of Deaf Ministry in 1998, the North American Division voted to set up an NAD Deaf

Ministry Committee. It was first chaired by Elder Vasquez, and later by Debra Brill.

Debra was a very gracious Chairperson, and really had the needs of the Deaf at heart. One notable achievement was her proposal to the NAD administration, advocating for the empowerment of the NAD Deaf Ministries Committee to appoint [vote] its members and oversee annual funding allocations for Deaf Ministries. This approach gave more control and responsibilities to Deaf leadership for this ministry in North America.

Nohelani Jarnes shared her remarks about Debra Brill's passing: "Truly sad news indeed! Debra was such an important part of the process of where Deaf Ministry is today. Her listening ears and gentle advice is what healed and guided. Now she sleeps waiting for Christ!" Klaudia Staples wrote: "So sad to hear this. Debra was an empowering and thoughtful leader. So enjoyed getting to know her when we went to Brazil together."

Amanda Colgan added: "I had the pleasure of serving on the NAD Deaf Ministries committee under Debra Brill's chairmanship. She consistently exhibited [showed] professionalism, always paired with a warm smile. Our trip to Brazil offered me a chance to get to know her more before her retirement."
