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Follow the Star

SERMONVIEW

Many of us are familiar with the Wise Men of the Bible, especially around Christmas. We usually think of three, richly dressed kings presenting their gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh to the baby Jesus, but do we really know who the Magi were? Interestingly, Matthew is the only Gospel that mentions the Magi. He says that they were "Wise Men from the East," but that is all that Matthew tells us about these three strangers. So who were the Magi?

Most of us use the words "Magi," "Wise Men," and "Kings" to mean the same thing, but are they really same? The word Matthew uses in his language comes from the Persian word "Magus" which means "Magi." In ancient Persia, Magi were Zoroastrian priests (Zoroastrianism is a religion). But the word Matthew uses may have meant several things, including "lord priests," "the powerful," or "astrologers." In Jesus' day, astrology was

the study of the stars and did not have to include magic. The simple answer to all of this is that we really do not know who or what the Magi were. They were some sort of rich scholars or priests and we know that they studied the stars, but we do not know much more than that. It is very likely that they were not actual kings, but that they were wealthy and wise enough to be honored as kings. The Magi were most likely wealthy astrologer-priests, or simply put, "Wise Men."

According to Matthew 2:1, 2, the Wise men arrived in Jerusalem looking for the newborn King. In verse 2, it says, "Where is the newborn king of the Jews? We saw his star as it rose, and we have come to worship him" (Matthew 2:2, NLT). The Wise Men had been studying the stars in great anticipation of the newborn King. They were so anxious to meet Him that when they saw what they call "his star" appear in the sky, they immediately left and traveled to Bethlehem to see Him. Matthew 2:9 says, "... And the star they had seen in the east guided them to Bethlehem. It went ahead of them and stopped over the place where the child was" (NLT). Not only did the star notify the Wise Men when

the Newborn King was born, but also led them to the place where He was. Matthew 2:10, 11 says that not only were the Wise Men filled with joy, but also brought gifts for their Newborn King. The Wise Men studied the stars for years waiting for the King, searched for Him when He was born, was led to where He was, and gave Him gifts.

Are you a Wise Man, looking for God this Christmas season? It says in Jeremiah 29:13, "You will search for me, and when you search for me with all your heart, you will find me" (ERV). Are you ready to give Him gifts? The best Christmas present you can give God is your heart; that is the only thing that He wants. It does not matter if you have given Him your heart a long time ago or yesterday, give it to Him every day! Like the Wise Men in the Bible following the star, God is your star, leading you in the right ways. He has given you the best presents ever: His love that never ends and His precious Son, Jesus, that died for your sins.

The Identifying Marks of the Little Horn in the Book of Daniel

At a playground, a mother was sitting on a park bench watching her children playing. A young man walked by, suddenly grabbed her purse and ran off. The mother saw him. She could not leave her children and run after him. Luckily, she had a cell phone with her and she called 911. A policeman arrived. He asked her what a man looked like. The mother said it was the

man with blonde hair. She did not give other descriptions, such as his looks, how tall he was, what clothes he wore, etc. Just a man with blonde hair. Would a policeman go out and catch every person that had blonde hair? With one description—blonde hair, do you think the policeman would ever find that man who stole the mother's purse? I don't think so. Without

enough description, the policeman could mistakenly arrest a wrong man.

This story did not really happen but it showed how important that we have enough description/ information to help us identify something correctly. Another example is a jigsaw puzzle. One jigsaw puzzle does not tell us what a picture looks like. You need to put all puzzle pieces together to have a complete picture. The same goes with our Bible teachings. We need to search not just one verse but several verses to help us understand better what our Bible teaches on different topics. Here, I am going to share with you what the “mark of the beast” means in the book of Daniel. Next quarter, I will talk about the mark of the beast in the book of Revelation.

Why the “mark of the beast?” One Saturday evening 45 years ago, I was at my friend’s parents’ home in a small town in Alberta, Canada. I became interested in religion leading me to ask my friend a question. He quickly took his Bible and showed me the book of Revelation on chapter 13, especially verses 17 and 18. Then he said that the Catholic pope was the Beast 666. Actually, I had no

idea what he was trying to tell me or what this was supposed to mean. Over the years, people including the religious leaders did not identify correctly what the mark of the beast was. This caused confusion and misunderstanding. This does not need to happen.

The book of Daniel and Revelation give not just one identifying mark but many to help us show what the mark of the beast was and it has been. Let us begin with Daniel 7 as it will lead us to a better understanding and help us to find the identifying marks of the beast, especially the little horn. Before I do, I am sure most of you are familiar with Daniel 2 that talks about a statue of gold, silver, bronze, iron, iron/clay and then a rock that hits and destroys the statue. With the historical facts that most of you probably learned in high school history class and through a Bible study, they clearly show that the gold is the symbol of Babylon, Silver—Persia, Bronze—Greece, Iron—Rome, and Iron/Clay—the division of the Roman Empire that has become what we have today’s European nations. Then the rock is the symbol of Jesus’ second coming. Daniel 7 adds more information to what is already said in Daniel 2. In Daniel 7,

we see a lion with wings that is the symbol of Babylon, a bear with three ribs—Persia, a leopard with four wings—Greece and then a fourth beast which is a powerful and terrible. That ugly monster having iron teeth that destroys all other kingdoms is pagan Rome. Many history books easily show that the Roman Empire happened after Greece. They also mention what happened to the Roman Empire afterwards, especially that it has then been divided into European nations which continue to this day.

Now, let’s focus on the little horn coming up from that same fourth beast in Daniel 7:7-26. You will see that God has explained several times about it to Daniel with additional descriptions as he was trying to understand the dream he saw. The little horn had many detailed identifying marks. They will show a connection to the mark of the beast in the Book of Revelation which we will talk about more in the next article.

In Daniel 7:7, 19, 23, they all mention the fourth beast with iron teeth which refers to the Pagan Roman Empire that ruled from 168 B.C. to A.D. 476. “Pagan” means non-Christian. At that time, they worshipped gods/goddesses. Its capital city was Rome, Italy. Daniel 7: 7, 20, 24, spoke of the ten horns that refer to the European nations that came up after the Roman empire lost its power.

Now let us focus on that little horn that has eyes and a mouth. Verses 7, 8 show that little horn came up from the fourth beast. It began in the area where the Roman empire was. It came up among the ten horns. The little horn also was in the same area where the division of European nations happened after the Roman empire broke up.

Verse 24 shows that the little horn—Papal Rome (Roman Church) arose after the ten horns which means it slowly grew into full power after the fall of Pagan Rome in A.D. 476. It is also located in Rome, Italy. It was

different from other horns. The kingdoms were often ruled by politics but Papal Rome was ruled by the combination of religion and politics. Also, verse 20 said that the little horn's appearance was greater than his fellows. The Popes (the heads of Roman Church) had great power over all rulers of European nations during the Dark Ages. That period was considered as the Holy Roman Empire after the fall of pagan Rome.

That same little horn in verses 8, 20, 24 pulled out the three horns. These three horns were the three tribes: Heruli in A.D. 493, Vandals in A.D. 534 and Ostrogoths in A.D. 538. These tribes prevented Papal Rome from having full power and authority. These three tribes were beaten by the little horn—Papal Rome through its military power. They no longer exist today as they were totally uprooted as in verse 8.

Again, in verses 8, 20, 21, 25, they said that the little horn spoke great words against God, persecuted/attacked the saints (God's people), and planned to change times and law. The Papal Rome used its traditional man-made teachings instead of the Bible for theological

teachings, claimed to be God on Earth, and to have the power to forgive sins, etc. It also claimed to have an authority over God's law by changing the day of worship from the 7th day Sabbath to the first day, Sunday. Papal Rome added many man-made teachings that are not in the Bible. Many God's people were killed because they refused to follow the Roman church's teachings. In year 2000, Pope John Paul II apologized for what his church did. However, the Roman church does not change its teachings that are not supported by the Bible.

Verse 25 shows that the Papal power lasted 1,260 years, starting in A.D. 538 when it had full power after defeating the Ostrogoths. Then it lost its power temporarily in A.D. 1798 when General Berthier of France arrested the pope. Actually, a time (1 year), times (2 years) and half a time (half year) bring to a total of 3 ½ years which is 1260 days as in Revelation 12:6, 14 and 42 months as in Revelation 13:5. More will be said about them in the next article. It wouldn't make sense for the Papal Rome (little horn) to rule for a short time of 3 ½ years. Babylon, Persia, Greece and Rome each ruled for a long time so

it makes sense that the Papal Rome ruled for a long time too and it is still here today. Also, based on Ezekiel 4:6, God said to Ezekiel, "I assign you, a day for each year" so 1260 days became 1260 years. Eventually, the Papal Rome will be destroyed forever by God as noted in verse 26.

Identifying marks of the little horn

1. Arose out of the fourth beast—Daniel 7:7, 8
2. Among the ten horns—Daniel 7:8
3. After the ten horns—Daniel 7:24
4. Different from other horns—Daniel 7:24
5. Appearance was greater than his fellows—Daniel 7:20
6. Uprooted three kingdoms—Daniel 7:8, 20, 24
7. Spoke great words against God—Daniel 7:8, 20, 25
8. Persecuted God's people—Daniel 7:21, 25
9. Changed times and law—Daniel 7:25
10. Ruled for 1260 years—Daniel 7:25

All of these identifying marks of the little horn clearly points to the Roman church. There are no other things that matched all of these identifying marks. My old

history book I had when I was a student at Gallaudet University 44 years ago and the history books I presently teach to my high school students at a school for the deaf supported many facts that had been said here. More will be said in the book of Revelation in the next article.

God warned us about this Roman church that fell away from Biblical truths. God was not pleased with what it had done. Daniel as in 7:28 was very concerned with all of what had been shown to him and his face became pale (white). We all should be equally concerned about the little horn's role in the last days, especially how it can influence our faith and our stand for God. With all what is happening today in our country and the world, Peter as in 1 Peter 5:7-9, encourages us to give all of our worries to our God and asks us to be clear minded and watchful because the devil is like a roaring lion looking to destroy us. Peter asked us to resist him, stay strong in our faith, knowing that our brothers throughout the world also face the same sufferings.

Something for Stevie

I try not to be prejudiced, but I had my doubts about hiring Stevie. His placement counselor told me that he would be a good, dependable busboy [in a restaurant where a person cleans the tables after the customers left].

But I had never had a mentally handicapped employee and wasn't sure I wanted one. I wasn't sure how my customers would think of Stevie. He was short, a little heavy, with the smooth facial features and thick-tongued speech of Down syndrome. I wasn't worried about most of my trucker customers, because truckers don't generally care

who takes care of tables as long as the meatloaf platter is good and the pies are homemade.

The four-wheeler drivers were the ones who concerned me; the loud talking college kids traveling to school; the rich people who secretly polish their silverware with their napkins because they were afraid of catching some dreaded "truckstop germ;" the pairs of white shirted business men. I knew those people would be uncomfortable around Stevie, so I closely watched him for the first few weeks.

I shouldn't have worried. After the first week, Stevie had my staff wrapped around

his stubby little finger, and within a month my truck regulars had adopted him as their official truck stop hero. After that I really didn't care what the rest of the customers thought of him. He was like a 21-year-old in blue jeans and Nikes, eager to laugh and eager to please, but he paid his attention to his duties. Every salt and pepper shaker were exactly in its place, not a bread crumb or coffee was visible, when Stevie got done with the table. Our only problem was convincing him to wait to clear a table until after the customers were finished. He would hover in the background, shifting his weight from one foot to the other, looking around the dining room until a table was empty. Then he would go to the empty table and carefully clear the dishes and glasses onto cart and wipe the table up with a rag. He took pride in doing his job exactly right, and you had to love how hard he tried to please each and every person he met.

Over time, we learned that he lived with his mother, a widow who was disabled after repeated surgeries for cancer. They lived on their Social Security benefits in public housing two miles from the truck stop. Money was tight, and what I paid

him helped them to be able to live together instead of sending Stevie to a group home.

The restaurant was a gloomy place that morning last August, the first morning in three years that Stevie missed work. He was at the Mayo Clinic in Rochester getting a new valve or something put in his heart. His social worker said that people with Down's syndrome often had heart problems at an early age, and there was a good chance he would come through the surgery in good shape and be back at work in a few months.

The staff was excited later that morning when word came that he was out of surgery, in recovery and doing fine. Frannie, my head waitress, shouted with joy. Belle Ringer, one of our regular trucker customers, stared at the sight of the 50-year-old Grandmother of four doing a victory dance beside his table. Frannie was embarrassed and smoothed her apron.

He grinned. "Ok, Frannie, what was that all about?" he asked.

"We just got word that Stevie is out of surgery and going to be okay."

"I was wondering where was he and I had a new joke

to tell him. What was the surgery about?"

Frannie quickly told Belle Ringer and the other two drivers sitting at his booth about Stevie's surgery, then sighed.

"Yeah, I am glad he is going to be ok," she said, "but I don't know how he and his mom are going to handle all the bills. From what I hear, they are barely getting by as it is.

Belle Ringer nodded thoughtfully, and Frannie hurried off to wait on the rest of her tables.

Since I hadn't had time to look for a new busboy to replace Stevie. I really didn't want to replace him. The girls were taking care their own tables that day until we decided what to do.

After the morning rush, Frannie walked into my office. She had a couple of paper napkins in her hand with a funny look on her face.

"What's up?" I asked.

"I didn't get that table where Belle Ringer and his friends were sitting cleared off after they left, and Pony Pete and Tony Tipper were sitting there when I got back to clean it off, She said, "This was folded and tucked under a coffee cup."

She handed me the napkin, and three \$20 fell on my desk when I opened it.

On the outside, in big, bold letters, was printed "Something for Stevie."

"Pony Pete asked me what that was all about," she said, "so I told him about Stevie and his mom and everything, and Peter looked at Tony and Tony looked at Peter, and they ended up giving me this."

She handed me another paper napkin that had "Something for Stevie" written on it's outside. Two \$50 bills were tucked within its folds.

Frannie looked at me with wet, shiny eyes, shook her head and said simply "truckers."

That was three months ago. Today is Thanksgiving, the first day Stevie is supposed to be back to work. His placement counselor said Stevie been looking forward to the day when the doctor said he could work. Stevie called 10 times in the past week. He wanted to make sure we knew he was coming. He was afraid that we had forgotten him or that his job was in trouble. I planned to have his mother bring him to work, met them in the parking lot and invited them both to celebrate his day back.

Stevie was thinner and paler, but couldn't stop smiling as he pushed

through the doors and headed for the back room where his apron and cart were waiting.

"Hold up there, Stevie, not so fast," I said. I took him and his mother by their arms. "Work can wait for a minute. To celebrate your coming back, I give you breakfast for you and your mother."

I led them toward a large corner booth at the rear of the room. I could feel and hear the rest of the staff following behind as we marched through the dining room. Looking over my shoulder, I saw booth after booth of smiling truckers empty and join the possession.

We stopped in front of the big table. The surface was covered with coffee cups, saucers and dinner plates, all sitting slightly crooked on dozens of folded paper napkins.

"First thing you have to do, Stevie, is clean up this mess," I said. I tried to sound stern.

Stevie looked at me, and then at his mother, then pulled out one of the napkins. It has "Something for Stevie" printed on the outside. As he picked it up, two \$10 bills fell onto the table. Stevie stared at the money, then at all the napkins under the tableware, each with his name printed or written on it.

I turned to his mother. "There is more than \$10,000 in cash and checks on that table, all from truckers and trucking companies that heard about your problems. Happy Thanksgiving."

Well, it got real noisy about that time, with everybody hollering and shouting, and there were a few tears, as well. But you know what's funny? While everybody else was busy shaking hands and hugging each other, Stevie, with a big, big smile on his face, was busy clearing all the cups and dishes from the table. Best worker I ever hired.



How to Resist Temptations Successfully

Temptation is the desire to do something wrong or unwise. Satan and his evil angels tempt us with wrong suggestions and ideas. Satan is the originator of all temptations. Satan wants us to fall into his miserable hopelessness. As we now know that Satan watches to get an advantage over people who are curious to do the sin of pleasure. The Bible shows clearly about temptation. "When people are tempted, they should not say, 'God is

Jesus was tempted but He resisted them by faith in the Father. You see that temptation itself is not sin, but when a person accepts temptation then he sins. Read about Jesus' first temptation to help you to understand that temptation itself is not sin. "Jesus fasted for forty days and nights. After this, he was very hungry. The devil came to Jesus to tempt him, saying, "If you are the Son of God, tell these rocks to become bread." Jesus answered, "It is written in the Scriptures, 'A person lives not on bread alone, but by everything God says' " (Matthew 4:2-4). To prove the point that Jesus didn't sin when He was tempted. Satan tempted (suggested) Jesus to go against the word of God. "For our high priest is able to understand our weaknesses. He was tempted in every way that we are, but he did

not sin" (Hebrews 4:15). Let us avoid whatever temptations come to us. Ask God in your prayer to resist temptations.

"Do not love the world or the things in the world. If you love the world, the love of the Father is not in you" (1 John 2:15).

Here is a good message of how to be successful in resisting temptations from the book, *Thoughts from the Mount of Blessing*. "If we enter on Satan's ground we have no promise of protection from his [Satan's] power. We should close every way by which the tempter may find access to us. . . .

"The only safeguard against evil is the indwelling of Christ in the heart through faith in His righteousness. It is because selfishness is in our hearts that temptation has power over us. But when we behold the great love of God, selfishness appears to us in its ugly character, and we desire to have it removed from the soul. As the Holy Spirit glorifies Christ, our hearts are softened and subdued, the temptation loses its power, and the

grace of Christ transforms the character” (Adapted, page, 118).

Here is good advice from the Bible, James 4:7, 8, ERV—“So give yourselves to God. Stand against the devil, and the devil will run away from you. Come near to God, and God will come near to you. You are sinners, so clean sin out of your lives. You are trying to follow God and the world at the same time. Make your thinking pure.” “And because you belong to Christ Jesus, God’s peace will stand guard

over all your thoughts and feelings. His peace can do this far better than our human minds” (Philippians 4:7, ERV).

Let us pray faithfully and ask God to help us to stand strong against the evil temptations till Jesus comes soon. Remember Jesus loves you all dearly for He died for you all of us.

Tomato: The Everyday Superfood

A review of more than 100 studies showed that eating more tomatoes daily could make you healthier, protect your skin from sun damage, and lower your risk of modern diseases.

A lot of evidence already shows that eating tomatoes and tomato products reduces the rates of cancer, especially prostate. But a recent review published in the American Journal of Lifestyle Medicine gives good reasons for eating this red fruit: better skin, bone, and brain health.

The tomato provides important nutrients such as vitamin C, vitamin A (as beta-carotene), fiber, and potassium. But it is the high amount of lycopene and other such phytonutrients that make it a superfood. Tomato is the richest source of lycopene in the Western diet. Lycopene is a strong antioxidant with a strength many times greater than vitamin E!

Whole tomatoes and

tomato products also provide anti-inflammatory and anti-blood clotting effects, and they are nature’s capsule of multiple active ingredients.

In studies of prostate cancer patients, the highest blood concentrations were reached within three months of taking lycopene supplements (using doses between 15-90 mg per day). However, while earlier studies focused on lycopene supplements, recent evidence shows it’s best to use the whole tomato, and a 15 mg daily dose may be good to aim for. How can you get this from foods? See the table below.

Processing tomatoes and also cooking them with a little oil helps increase the absorption of lycopene and other carotenoids into the body.

“Eat a variety of vegetables, especially dark-green and red and orange vegetables and beans and peas,” is a key recommendation in the new U.S. dietary guidelines.

Vegan Croquettes



1 lb. firm tofu, mashed well
1 oz. cashew
1 oz. pimento
1 oz. onion
1 oz. celery
1 oz. green pepper
1/2 tsp. garlic salt
3/4 tsp. seasoning salt
1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. Brewer's nutritional yeast (or flavoring like Kitchen Boquet)
1 Tbsp. Vegex, Marmite, or Savorex (check for gluten-free ingredients, if you wish it to be gluten-free)
Chicken-style seasoning to taste
1/3 cup bread crumbs

*You may be more generous with the vegetable ingredients.

Mix together well. Form into patties or balls. Bake on cookie sheet at 350 degrees until golden brown. 15 minutes and turn over till 10 minutes or you wait till it turns golden brown. (Baking is better than frying the patties)

It can be "meatball" spaghetti.

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
